

Pamela M Still was born to parents Joseph and Dorothy (Foreman) Still. She graduated Magna Cum Laude from State University of New York (SUNY) in Brockport, New York. Pamela worked for K-Mart Corporation from 1975 to 2002 as an assistant manager, in locations of Albany, NY, Pittsfield, MA, and Carlisle, PA. In 2002 she was employed by Kraft Foods, retiring after 11 years to focus on her rental properties, and on the restoration of her 1794 historic stone house located along Baltimore Avenue in Mt Holly Springs, which she purchased in 1984. The house is classified as the first mansion in Mt Holly Springs, and includes a small carriage house, five outbuildings, with an attached garage. The history of the house is registered in the 1886 History of Cumberland County and Mt Holly Springs Centennial publications. In 2018 the home was recognized by the Cumberland County Historic Society; its research can be found on file there. Pamela is an avid gardener; her yard was chosen as “Garden of the Month” by the Carlisle Garden Club in 2016.

Pamela is dedicated to serving the community of Mt Holly Springs. She has served as Vice-Regent of Cumberland County DAR, board member of Carlisle Garden Club, board member of First Night Carlisle, steering committee of the Greater Carlisle Project, Mt Holly Springs Heart & Soul, and board member of the Amelia Givin Library. In 2014, Pamela was elected to the Mt Holly Springs Borough Council serving as Vice-Chair of the Planning Commission, a liaison for the Zoning Hearing Board, Health Safety & Welfare Commission and representative for the Western Council Government.

During her 4 years on Council, she headed a revitalization committee to move Mt Holly Springs forward. She worked on a streetscape grant to improve the main corridor of Mt Holly, she helped with preliminary plans to build a conservation park along Mountain Creek and worked on a grant for banners and park benches.

Pamela’s proudest achievement was helping with the recognition and the historical importance of the Mt Tabor AME Church. Pamela presented a storytelling interview about the church, receiving National attention. In 2017, Pamela ended her Council term and was recognized for her contributions to the Mt Holly Springs community. In 2023, Pamela wrote and acted in the historical pageant “Holly Heroines: Stories Seldom Told” for the Mt Holly Springs Sesquicentennial –150th year of Incorporation celebration on April 15th. 2023.

Pamela loves her family, friends, animals, her home and community. Her mother taught her to “leave the world in a better place and that would be her legacy”.
